WORK SITE POLICY

As stated previously it appears we are listed under **Section 28** as an essential service.

This may change and I will keep you posted.

Construction crews play an essential role in maintaining homes and businesses. If our type of work were to stop for an extended period of time, homes could be subject to considerable damage and insurance claims would be astronomical. We will continue to stay open until the government decides otherwise, or it becomes unsafe to do so.

Below is our policy for work sites;

- Keep a copy of the list from the government of the essential services in your truck. (28)
- We will supply Hand sanitizer for every truck, employee and work site.
The lead installer is responsible to let us know if supply is low.
- Each time you enter your truck, sanitize all handles and steering wheel, repeat process at the end of the day.
- Hand wash as much as possible, every 2 hours as a minimum.
- Hand wash before leaving site for any reason and hand wash prior to exiting truck.
- No sharing of tools is allowed, if you need tools we will supply them for you, please provide a list.
- All tools will be sanitized with Spray 9 or equivalent (We will supply) This needs to be done a minimum of 2x per day, once in the morning and again at end of day.
- Maintain social distancing of 2 m (6.5ft) as recommended by the government.
If you need to remind people please do so.
- **IF YOU ARE SICK STAY HOME.**

We need to take this VERY seriously. Anyone who does not take this seriously will be removed from work sites. Many of our employees, and trades have high risk people at home, we need to respect them and listen to the experts.

Also, being listed an essential service is not something to be taken lightly. We have a responsibility now to be role models and leaders, to show everyone what we can do when given a challenge. And, we all need to work together.

As long as we are open I will fight to get work and I will do my best to keep operating.
